

Creating Your CV

What is a CV?

A CV, or Curriculum Vitae, is a document that shows your education, work experience, skills, and achievements. It's like a personal advertisement that helps potential employers see who you are, what you've done, and how you can be useful to their company.

Why is a CV important?

How to build a CV

Contact Information	Start with your full name, phone number, and email address. Make sure this information is up to date and professional.
Personal Profile	Your personal profile is a short statement at the beginning of your CV that describes who you are and what you can offer an employer. Aim for 3-4 sentences that capture your unique qualities and ambitions.
Education	List your educational background, starting with the most recent. Include the name of the school, the qualification, and dates attended.
Work Experience	Include any work experience or volunteer work you've done. For each position, list your job title, the name of the organisation, the dates you worked there, and a few bullet points outlining your responsibilities and achievements.
Skills/Achievements	Highlight any relevant skills you have or any specific achievements you'd like to draw attention to. Be honest about your level of expertise.
Hobbies and Interests	Including your hobbies and interests can give employers a sense of your personality and help you stand out. Choose hobbies that show positive traits like teamwork, creativity, or leadership.

Writing an outstanding Personal Profile

Your personal profile is your chance to make a strong first impression. Here are some tips:

- 1. Keep it concise: Your personal profile should be brief and to the point—around 3-4 sentences. Clearly introduce yourself, your key skills, and your career goals. Avoid unnecessary details.
- **2. Focus on your strengths:** Highlight what makes you stand out. Whether it's your passion for a specific field, problem-solving abilities, or teamwork skills, emphasize what you bring to the table.
- **3. Show enthusiasm:** Let your passion for the role or industry come through. Employers are drawn to candidates who are genuinely excited about the opportunity.
- **4. Tailor it to the job:** Customize your profile for each application. Focus on the skills and experiences that are most relevant to the role you're applying for. This shows you've put thought into how you fit the position.

What to write for hobbies and why its important
